

## **BRIGHT FUTURE LEARNING CENTER MARKS ONE-YEAR ANNIVERSARY**

Bright Future Learning Center, which provides homework and study assistance and SAT prep for school children, is celebrating its one-year anniversary.

The business on Route 22 opened in February of 2004 and has seen a 1500% increase in its business since its doors opened last February.

Paul Dhillon, Founder and Director of Education for Bright Future Learning Center, says, "This past year has been exciting and challenging for us. We began with just a few students and have experienced steady growth through the year. More importantly, we have made a positive and lasting impact on our students."

According to Dhillon, both children and parents are happy with the results they experience at Bright Future. "The students we help are always much more confident when we finish our work together. Many say they feel better about going to school and facing some challenging subjects with the knowledge and strategies that they've learned with us. Others who use Bright Future for college prep like PSAT's and SAT's tell us that they felt very confident when they went in to actually take the test, which can be a nerve-wracking experience."

Bright Future Learning Center helps students, grades kindergarten through high school, gain confidence, motivation and understand the fundamentals of learning. A low student-teacher ratio ensures that each student receives individual attention and the encouragement, skills and confidence to work independently.

They offer courses and programs in reading and writing, critical thinking skills, math and science fundamentals, geometry, pre-calculus/trigonometry, homework support for high school students and study strategies.

Bright Future staff also helps students prepare for the SAT's (SAT/PSAT/SAT II/SSAT). Beginning in March, 2005, a redesigned SAT will be introduced. As a result, Dhillon says, "Many students are feeling the need to take a prep class to help them manage this now 'uncharted course' that's where we can help."

Unlike other schools that offer SAT preparation with classes of up to 20 students, Bright Future offers individual, personal instruction. Dhillon explains, "Teachers are limited as to how much they can spread themselves. If a student is having a difficult time, we can take the time to identify that problem and work on that area. In a class of 10 to 20 students, that isn't possible."
